

Field Day Plans

The Club will be operating on June 23 & 24 from Highland Road Park Observatory. We will run 3 HF stations, a GOTA station for new hams and unlicensed operators, and possibly a VHF and/or satellite station. We hope to operate from 10m to 80m on the HF and GOTA stations. We will be serving dinner on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday.

The observatory is open to the public on Saturday so we will give them preference at the GOTA station during that time. <u>After 10 PM Saturday</u>, the GOTA station will be available to new hams. Anyone can operate one of the HF stations, or provided a control operator who has privileges on that band is present at the radio.

NEEDED: We need 4 batteries for running the radios on battery power. We have one 40M and one 80M dipole. The tribander will not rotate, and I need help to check it out. Remember to put your call sign on anything you provide because it may get lost.

I am leaving next Friday, June 15 for Virginia, and will return on Friday evening, June 22. I should be in phone and email contact the entire time.



Crickets!!

Many thanks to Buddy Brown, N5BUD, for getting us all excited about Crickets and leading the undertaking! Buddy is a great Elmer and guite an accomplished builder. For the club build last month several BRARC members gathered in one of the LSU physics labs to assemble Crickets. These were kits offered by the Four State QRP Group, a source of several quality kits for the QRP community. The Cricket 80a is an 80 meter crystal controlled minimalist CW transceiver which can be used by any class license including Technician. This simple rig is a fully functional self-contained transceiver which includes a 9 volt on board battery, built in straight key, and a headphone jack. Just add an antenna and you're on the air!

We came in with different experience levels of kit-building. Under the watchful eyes of Buddy -N5BUD, Paul - WA4MXT, and Dana - AD5VC, along with a lot of solder smoke and a couple of minor burns on the fingers, several kits were successfully completed and tested. A couple of Crickets still need a little more soldering to complete the build. I think all would agree it was fun and a great experience!

We viewed the RF signal on an oscilloscope and actually had a short QSO inside the lab between Crickets using only a dummy load for an antenna. Any suggestions for the next project? Make sure to participate in the next club build no matter what it is, and you will be guaranteed to have a good time with some interesting folks. And you might even walk away with a new useful piece of equipment! I know I did!

This write-up was submitted by Tony De Biasi, K2SG, who served on the USS Kidd. Tony is from New Jersey, and was able to visit Baton Rouge several years ago, and toured the USS Kidd. I enjoyed reading this very interesting account of his experiences. As you know, the USS Kidd is my favorite station away from home. – Editor

"I was able to talk my way into the Radio Room, and show my wife where I spent several years of my life. It was a great experience for both of us to see the old shack including the old chairs and hooks we used to strap in during rough seas.

There was a fire extinguisher just outside the entrance to the Radio Room, and during an ORI inspection in Guantanamo, Cuba, the inspector put a note on the extinguisher that it was empty so we couldn't us it during the drill. Later he declared several radios on fire inside the shack. I immediately grabbed the extinguisher outside the Radio Room, and simulated extinguishing the fire. When the inspector brought to my attention the note that the extinguisher was empty, I then pointed out to him a note under his note that it had been refilled. Those were the fun days on the Kidd.

I served on the Kidd from April of 1960 until late 1962. I arrived as a Seaman, and left as a RM2. When I arrived there was a Chief Radioman, one First Class Radioman, one Third Class and myself. We were in Norfolk, VA for a few months and then moved to Philadelphia. During my couple of years on the Kidd, we frequently picked up Reserves in Philadelphia, and had them for about 2 weeks of active duty training. We also spent some time chasing Russian Subs around the Caribbean, Central America, and South America. I also recall some time patrolling off the coast of Cuba not far from the Harbor entrance to Gitmo.

I never received official permission from the Navy, but the Captain allowed me to operate /mm using my old call W2RFS. It was my first experience operating /mm, and I always seemed to have plenty of takers wanting to work a Navy ship. I was lucky that I entered the hobby when I was 14, and by the time I went to Radio school in Norfolk, VA, my code speed was well past what the Navy required to graduate from school.

The Captain was an avid fisherman, and I would setup one of the VHF radios so he could listen/talk to the fishing fleets especially when we were in the New England area. During one of our training exercises off the New England coast, a sub came up across our bow and we struck its stern taking off its short flagpole. On the way back to Norfolk, we found a small pleasure boat many miles off shore drifting without power. There was a couple onboard and a very small infant somewhat dehydrated. We towed their boat after taking them on board the Kidd and brought them back to shore in Connecticut. It was our big and only rescue during my time on the Kidd. We did rush to Haiti in 1960 along with another Destroyer which may have been the USS McNair to evacuate our Ambassador and some staff due to some sort of political unrest. It was the only time all the Radiomen were armed with 45s.

I remember the antenna switching and the switches for the speakers to patch circuits to the bridge and in the shack were not state of the art.

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Continued -

When at sea we would often have 3 or 4 speakers to monitor some with encrypted calls that would change daily. Always one for NYKF, and one listening to NSS fox broadcast. Right alongside the left operating position was a SRT-15 transmitter, and in the bottom drawer was the power supply for the 1500w transmitter. One day while sitting there the paper capacitors blew up in the power supply knocking me right off the chair. The explosion was very loud sounding like a cherry bomb or very loud firecracker. When we were brave enough to open the Power supply drawer there was hardly anything but pieces of paper left. Somehow the ET's got it fixed.

We once had a fire on board in the one of the shops while we were at sea. It was quickly controlled, but I recall seeing all the smoke and wondering if the ship was going to go down. Fortunately it looked much worse than it was.

I have lots of great memories from my time on the Kidd and feel fortunate I was able to revisit the ship so many years later thanks to the efforts of so many."

Hamshack Hotline is a free dedicated VoIP for ham operators. Its intended use is to enable the transmission of emergency and/or tactical traffic when normal radio traffic handling is overloaded or unavailable. It's another tool in the bag for emergency operators.

Canadian Radio Amateurs Petition Parliament to End Deliberate Interference

Radio Amateurs in Canada — primarily in the Province of Quebec — have mounted a **petition drive** demanding that members of the House of Commons prompt decisive regulatory action against a Quebec resident who has been causing deliberate interference . . . Petitioners claim that the individual's "malicious intentions" have been "threatening the security of emergency radio communication in the province," and they called upon Parliamentary lawmakers "to ensure the security" of HF radio communication.

"For 2 years, a Nicolet resident, near Trois-Rivières [Quebec], illegally set up a transmitting radio station and is generating interference on purpose," the petition recounts. "Amateur Radio operators in Quebec have identified the illegal radio station and brought it to the attention of Innovation, Science and Economic Development (**ISED**) Canada, and its inspectors seized the individual's radio equipment." One of ISED's functions is telecommunications regulation.

According to the petition, the alleged offender "acquired new equipment right away and returned to jamming the airwaves." The petition identifies the alleged offender as a male who is "known to police in Nicolet and Trois-Rivières" and "has regular encounters with the law."

"We are calling on the government to provide more support to the Department of Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada, so that it can intervene more decisively in this matter," the petition declared . . .

... as of June 12, the online petition had gathered more than 625 signatures, primarily from Quebec and Ontario. Canada has more than 50,000 Amateur Radio licensees."
